**In the Apiary**

You will be pleased that I am not going to go through all the tasks for this month as I am under a three-line whip to keep these notes short, but will just mention...

Robbing: Keep 'them' out

Review: Open and review each stock, take any necessary steps including varroa treatment, so as to ensure it emerges healthy and strong in spring. A key is to have it well supplied with autumn raised bees.

Feeding: consider what feeding will be necessary. I try to start feeding in the last week of August, and finish by 20th September.

Equipment: Is it fit for purpose?

There is no quicker way for killing bees than a cold damp hive.

Don't forget the cause may not be the hive itself, but an unsuitable location such as that with long wet grass, dripping trees or those never warmed or dried by winter sun or winds. And if your hive leaks you are simply asking for trouble.

As usual, have fun and please get ready for the event of the year, our Honey Show on 27th September.
